How do you do?

What do you love most about writing stories for children?

The best thing about writing for children, for you, is that quite frankly, you are the best audience EVER! You know what you like and what you don't like. You also have the BEST imaginations. An absolutely perfect combination.

Where do you get your inspiration from?

Inspiration can come from anywhere and everywhere. The inspiration for THIS BOOK HAS ALPACAS AND BEARS struck when I took my children out to a farm park during half-term. The alpaca there, Joules, looked amazing and when it struck me that I couldn't think of any picture books featuring alpacas the idea was born. Rikin Parekh illustrated this book, and his artwork brings so much energy and humour to each page.

When did you start writing?

I came to writing quite late. Mainly because it had never struck me that I could actually try to be a writer. I've always been a reader, I've always loved books – but honestly, it wasn't until a few years ago that I realised that I could try to write books to. All I needed was the determination.

What was your first ever story about ?

My first ever story to be published was I DON'T LIKE BOOKS. NEVER. EVER. THE END. I really wanted to write a story about books, and I thought about how much fun it would be if the books came to life. I've always wondered what it would like to jump into a story. Any story. That would be fun, wouldn't it? Mabel was brought to life by the super talented illustrator Sharon Davey, I just love the expressions she gives Mabel – especially those grumpy ones!

Have you always loved stories and reading?

Yes! I've always loved reading, absolutely. Every summer holiday I would get on my bike and visit my local library to stock up on books. I didn't finish every single book, and I might not have enjoyed every single book, but that didn't matter because I had fun finding out which books I DID like. Libraries are the BEST places.

What is your favourite children's book and why?

What? My favourite book? That's like asking me to name my favourite child!! I can't do it!! Tooooo hard. How about I tell you some of my favourites at the moment? Ok here goes... Jabari Jumps, Julian is a

Thank you so much Upper Beeding Primary School for your fabulous questions, I loved answering them.



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


TEACHER PICKS !

The Invisible by Tom Percival

My book review is for a "Picture Books to Shout About" nomination. To be fair it was hard to have a favourite amongst the ones chosen for this year as the theme was all about friendship, working together, and making a difference. All four books were inspirational and within the classes there was not a clear favourite as all books were equally enjoyed.

For me, by a fraction, my favourite was a book called "**The Invisible"** by Tom Percival.

It is a very thought-provoking book and at the back of the book is a heart-felt note from Tom, sharing his own experience of growing up with very little money. He recalls how he remembers seeing ice on his bedframe in the family caravan, his home freezing, but also full of love and books. This book is so powerful. It is both gentle and thoughtprovoking and gives a window into a life that for many goes unnoticed. Tom's use of colour helps you feel what Isobel is feeling. And at the end of the book, we feel uplifted, with Isobel finding a new sense of joy and belonging and that she has made a difference in her world. Mrs Gilpin – Kenya Class *****





The Boy at the Back of the Class by Onjali Q. Raúf:

This fantastic book deals with some mature themes of immigration, seeking asylum and life as a refugee through the eyes of children. A heart-warming story of adventure, battling prejudices and friendship.

I like the detailed, yet simplistic illustrations and that the book is broken up into three chapters: Chapter 1 – the boy; Chapter 2 – the duck; Chapter 3 – the discovery, it definitely adds to the overall story.
